CERT PROGRAM STRENGTHENED WITH NEW EXPERT LEADERSHIP

A new chapter of the City's Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training program has begun. Public Safety and Emergency Services Manager Mike Grant is enthusiastic about involving all past and present CERT members. At July's CERT meeting, various topics were discussed, including organizational structure, emergency communications, upcoming training, and personal readiness. In light of recent fires throughout California, the team agreed that supporting first responders during wildfire events is a top priority.

Special guests from the Los Angeles Emergency Preparedness Foundation's Community Brigade Pilot Program emphasized the



importance of having trained volunteer wildland firefighters in the Hidden Hills community. These volunteers bridge the gap between professional first response agencies and local communities during major disaster events. Hidden Hills is one of only seven selected communities in LA County to participate in the program. The next CERT meeting will focus on emergency radio communications, firefighting equipment inspections, and planning for Fiesta 2024. Unique

to CERT, events like the Fiesta provide an opportunity to practice deployment strategies in a low-stress environment. Training foundational skills such as communication, set-up, and recovery during planned events will enable the team to respond quickly and efficiently during critical incidents.

If you are interested in serving the Hidden Hills community in a meaningful way, CERT meetings are held on the 4th Tuesday of every month at City Hall. The next meeting will be on Tuesday, August 27, 6:30pm. Radio check at 6pm.

After a major disaster, first responders may be inundated with emergency requests and demands and unable to immediately respond to all those in need. In such a crisis, it will be neighbors assisting neighbors for immediate first aid and life-sustaining needs until emergency response personnel can arrive. The County of Los Angeles Fire Department is hosting a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) hybrid training to provide the public with basic training in safety and life-saving skills. Interested residents and current Hidden Hills CERT team members are encouraged to sign up.

Independent online courses are required to be completed prior to taking the in-person hands-on training session over two days beginning Saturday, August 10, 2024, being held at the Calabasas Community Center. Hidden Hills isn't just the best city in all Southern California; it's also the key to longevity and a fulfilling life. The city is home to many longtime residents, including two extraordinary "wonder women" who moved to Hidden Hills in the 50s, long before it was incorporated as a city in 1961.

Nancy Faner, 97 years young, and her husband Walter moved to Hidden Hills in 1951, where they built their home after purchasing a lot for \$4,995. Nancy had 4 "Hidden Hills babies" and her first-born child, Cindy, has the distinct honor of being the first baby to ever be born in Hidden Hills.

Nina Olander, 91 1/2 years young, and her husband Roland moved to Hidden Hills in 1958 for the excellent school district and they wished to own property with room to expand for their soon to be growing family. Nina was 7 months pregnant when they purchased the home that she still lives in today where she gave birth to 3 Hidden Hills babies.

Nancy and Nina have many fond memories of how Hidden Hills has developed and grown over the past 70 years and are honored to have been chosen your Fiesta 2024 Parade Grand Marshal's.

what to do when you encounter a **RATTLESNAKE**

We're in the middle of rattlesnake season when you're most likely to encounter a rattlesnake. Fortunately, rattlesnakes just aren't that into you. They generally are not aggressive and would rather avoid people. They'll often retreat if given space to move and don't feel threatened. Most bites happen when someone handles or accidentally touches a rattlesnake, which even offers a warning with its rattle that you might be too close.

What do rattlesnakes look like?

The tell-tale sign of a rattlesnake is on the end of its tail. But rattlesnakes don't always rattle before a strike. A rattle might also break off, and young rattlesnakes might only have a small rattle or button. As snakes shed their skin, a new rattle segment is formed. Other visual characteristics include a triangular head and scales that are keeled with a rough raised texture and matte appearance instead of smooth and shiny. They are earth tone, which helps them blend in with their surroundings.

Are all rattlesnake bites venomous?

No. Rattlesnakes often deliver what's known as a non-venomous dry bite as a warning, so if you are bitten remain calm, but act quickly. It's best to treat all bites as venomous and seek immediate medical attention as a venomous bite can cause severe injuries and even death.

Common symptoms of a venomous rattlesnake bite

- Extreme pain Bleeding Bruising
- Swelling in the mouth and throat Drooling
- Difficulty breathing Lightheadedness
- Nausea Swelling at the location of the bite
- Collapse Shock, in rare cases

How are rattlesnake bites treated?

- Remove items that constrict swelling, like watches, rings and shoes.
- Go to the nearest medical center.
- Do not put ice on the bite.
- Do not apply a tourniquet.
- Do not cut the wound.
- Do not try to suck venom out with your mouth.
